Here we are again, looking at another year and all that it may hold for us as an 'ohana. The 'ohana reunion held on Maui was a big success. Approximately 170 people attended the event held at the Kenolio Recreational Center in Kīhei on Saturday, August 10<sup>th</sup>. Planning via zoom meetings, combined with lunch and dinner meetings, made it fun and easy to fit all the pieces together. We hope that the reunion helps bridge the gap between generations, strengthen family connections, and answer 'ohana questions. A variety of printed material with historical information was available along with a detailed family display board. Movies of our 3-day event were posted to the website 808ukejams.com/moiha.

To start off our newsletter, we first wanted to showcase family members that have been instrumental in organizing the reunion and share a common interest in keeping our family connections and stories alive for future generations.



My name is **Maren Leimomi Kanekoa**, but most family members call me Lei. I was born on Maui, the fifth and last child of **Jacqueline Horner** and **William Kanekoa Jr**. (the first-born son of **Rachel Moiha** and **William Kanekoa Sr**.). I attended Kahului Elementary School then Maui Waena Intermediate for 6th-8th grade. I graduated from Maui High in 2000 then went on to get my undergraduate and graduate degrees at BYU-Provo in 2004 and 2007 respectively. I then went on a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints for 18 months in the New England area. When I came home from my mission, I moved to the Phoenix, AZ area for a few years, then the Olympia, WA area for a few more years, then the Portland, OR area for a few years. At

the end of 2020, I came home to live in Maui, and have stayed since, where I help take care of the house and my mother.

'Ohana is and always has been an important part of my life. Because I grew up living with my father's parents, I grew up hearing stories from my grandma about her family and her experiences on the east side of Maui. Because of all those stories, as well as my own experiences, that legacy of 'ohana and spiritualism has become a part of who I am. Kuhi no ka lima, hele no ka maka (Where the hands move, there let the eyes follow)


My biggest joy besides family: Performing for our kupuna. Seeing them react to music and hula.


